

Youth Ministry - Faith and Self Care

As Catholic Christians, we are taught that we are called to serve others. Strong emphasis is put on the message that Jesus calls us to serve those in need and those around us. But, by focusing so strongly on this message, we, as a Church, unintentionally send the message that serving others is everything. This is not to say that serving others isn't important. Jesus left us with the most amazing example of servant leadership, and the importance of service as part of being a Christian; but Jesus also left us with the wonderful example of the importance of taking care of ourselves.

Scripture gives us many examples of Jesus taking time away from the crowds, time separate from his disciples, and time in solitary prayer. In Mark 12:30-31 Jesus gives us the greatest commandment: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." Most of us, as people of faith, focus on the first and second parts; service to God and service to others. We focus on it so much that we forget about the third part, the qualifier for the first two parts: service to ourselves. Jesus tells us that we can only serve and love each other if we first love and care about ourselves. This is not permission to be selfish or not to care about the world, but it is proof that God understood the nature of human beings. He knew that we would be unable to adequately take care of others and serve the Lord if we don't take care of ourselves first.

In a world where we are constantly in motion and are surrounded by the "busyness" of life, we forget that as human beings and as people of faith, we are given permission to take care of ourselves. In order to take care of ourselves, we need to be aware of our boundaries and accept the fact that we cannot be everywhere or be doing everything. We need to leave time in our day, or at least our week, to take time and refill/recharge ourselves. For some, that might be taking a walk, a hike, or doing something athletic, for others it may be playing music, writing or painting, still for others it might be sitting in silence on the top of a mountain, on the beach, or at a lake, or it may just be taking time for prayer. Whatever it may be for each of us individually, we need to take the time to actually do it. This can be difficult in the midst of family, work, and other obligations; but it is important. It is so important that God made it part of His commandment to us. So, take a moment, as you sit here reading this article, and think about what brings

you joy, what recharges your batteries, what refills your soul, so that you can take on the things that God brings you. How can you make some of those things part of your week, if not part of your

daily life? And remember, God wants you to take care of yourself, just as much as He wants you to serve others.

Annual Report Continues.....

As we reported the Annual Finances (or "Treasures") in our last newsletter, we finish our reporting in this newsletter with our "Time and Talent" portion of our Annual Report.

Prayer and Worship:

The administration of the Sacraments and the celebration of the Eucharist each weekend are the source and summit of all we are and all we are called to be. There were over 300 masses celebrated at St. Joseph's during the past year with approximately 22,000+ people in attendance. Communion was given to approximately 15,000 people, 17 Baptisms were celebrated, 12 children received the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist for the first time, 13 youth received the sacrament of Confirmation, 4 Marriages were witnessed and 22 funerals were celebrated. Pastoral care of the sick, hospital visitation and communion calls to our homebound parishioners were also made on a regular basis.

All of the above services are supplied by the parish professional staff of:

- 1 Priest (full time & shared with Our Lady of Grace)
- 2 Deacons (unpaid)
- 1 Pastoral Associate for Administration
- 1 Pastoral Associate for Faith Formation (part time)
- 1 Pastoral Associate for Youth Ministry (shared with Our Lady of Grace)
- A team of Liturgical Musicians (1 paid with several volunteers)
- 2 Pastoral Associates for Maintenance (1 full time & 1 part time)
- 2 Pastoral Associates for Finance (both part time)
- Approximately 200+ volunteers in various ministries

Faith Formation & Youth Ministry:

We strive to teach the values, heritage and traditions of the Roman Catholic Church. Within this educational framework, we try to guide our youth to become lifelong witnesses to the reality of the Risen Christ through the sacramental life, personal and communal celebrations and charitable works.

During the 2016/2017 school year, we served 157 students from 102 families. Our program is assisted by the <u>volunteer</u> services of our catechists, aides and gatekeepers. As an integral part of the program and as a response to their Baptismal call to service, students at all levels were introduced to activities assisting the wider community. This past fall, our parish also sent five students from our Youth Ministry program to the National Catholic Youth Conference (NCYC). Aside from Sunday Liturgy, the Faith Formation and Youth Ministry programs serve the largest segment of our parish population. A nominal registration fee helps to offset, but does <u>not</u> cover the operating expenses of the program.



Annual Report Continues.....

Bereavement Ministry:

The Bereavement Ministry has cared for parishioners who have suffered the loss of loved one through death. They initially contact the family by sending a note of condolence and assist them in the preparation of the funeral (if celebrated here at St. Joseph's). A Memorial Mass is held annually for the deceased loved ones of our parish family.

Social Concerns Committee:

The mission of the Church has always included aspects of social concerns and outreach. Our Social Concerns development reach out to our community and beyond in providing direct and practical assistance to those in need and fostering positive relationships that help build the wider community of the world.

Regular monthly food drives benefit SICM (Schenectady Inner City Ministries) as well as our local Scotia Food Pantry. Monthly volunteers gather to make 300 sandwiches which are delivered to Bethesda House in Schenectady. Members coordinate and staff the SICM sponsored summer lunch program at our local park (we assisted in two weeks this past summer). Other collections include health care kits which are distributed at Bethesda House as well as collecting personal care items to support the Catholic Charities Personal Care Closet (these items are crucial to those on assistance as public assistance does not cover the cost of these items). Finally, the committee oversees the coordination of the Giving Tree which collects and distributes Christmas gifts to many organizations within the community.

Administration / Buildings & Grounds:

In addition to the ministerial services here at St. Joseph's, there is the whole area of Administration and Buildings & Grounds. This past year there were many repairs made to the church and Parish Center roof, boilers and air conditioners, Parish Center parking lot, classroom window replacements (due to two incidents of vandalism) as well as extensive tree removal at the Parish Center. It is important to note that many times there are repairs made to our facilities due to the generosity and talent of some of our parishioners which save the church a great deal of money and, for that, we are most grateful.

All of these items and more represent the TRUE SCOPE of our community. Your sacrificial gifts of *Time, Talent and Treasure* literally are the only means of meeting our obligations and make all these ministries possible. We will be highlighting many of these ministries (and more) in 2018 and hope that many of you will make a commitment to volunteer and help your church.

Cliff Semerad and his cat, Felix, receive a blessing from Fr. Peter in honor of the Feast of St. Francis.


