During this time of closure, we are taking the opportunity to clean the carpet and chairs in the church (the chairs have not been done since the renovation in 1996). It is through the donations to our **Building Maintenance** collection and separate designated donations that we are able to do this. A number of parishioners have volunteered in the past week to help rearrange and move chairs so that this work can be done in a minimal amount of time. Next week, after the work is done, the church will be put back together. We hope when we return to church, that everyone will notice the difference!



We continue to try to think of ways to stay connected to church during our closure and want to assure everyone that although our church doors may be closed, our "parish" is still very much intact. One suggestion that has been made is to **"Park & Pray"**. If you happen to be driving to the grocery store or pharmacy, consider stopping by the church and park for a moment and pray. Turn off the radio, turn off the car and just sit and pray. We would ask you to please refrain from any type of gathering and to keep the Social Distancing guidelines in place if you do happen to stop by. It is our hope that this small time of peace may bring some contentment to your day.



During this time of closure and as many have taken to viewing mass online, the Catholic faithful are encouraged to make a 'spiritual communion'. St. John Paul II writes that "it is good to cultivate in our hearts a constant desire for the sacrament of the Eucharist". This was the origin of the practice of 'spiritual communion', which has happily been established in the Church for centuries and recommended by saints who were masters of the spiritual life. Saint Teresa of Jesus wrote: 'When you do not receive communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a spiritual communion, which is a most beneficial practice; by it the love of God will be greatly impressed on you.'" (Ecclesia Eucharistia, no. 34).

Once again, we would like to pass along this short prayer that may be recited at the time the priest is receiving communion while you are watching a televised mass:

"My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen"



This week's tip: As we enter into our seventh week of closure, it is getting harder & harder to be away from friends, relatives, co-workers, etc. "Surprise" someone you know and send them a card or note just to say "I'm thinking of you!" Who knows ~ you may hit them on a particularly down day and it will be enough to bring a much needed smile to their face.

In last week's parish email blast, we had mentioned that the church bells would be rung on April 20th at 7 pm in solidarity with all those who have died or were suffering from the Coronavirus as well as for the healthcare workers, first responders and all those who bear a special burden during this time. We have received comments from several parishioners that said it was good to hear the bells ring and they would like to hear them again. In light of this, we will continue to ring the bells each Monday at 7 pm until we return to church – enjoy!
