## From the Pastor:

Today we find Jesus in a synagogue at Capernaum on the Sabbath. On a Sabbath this faithful Jew attends the synagogue, seemingly one of his favorite places to meet, greet, and teach people. We are told immediately however, that as a teacher, Jesus was, shall we say, in a class by himself. Those who heard him were amazed, astonished. Jesus was different. He did not teach as the traditional experts in the law. His style and command of the law was unique. He spoke, as we are told, "with authority." Given the fact that Jesus was not a known scribe or a rabbi, his teaching surprised the people who heard him. Who could this be? Needless to say, his fame spread throughout Galilee. He drew crowds. He healed. He fed. Jesus becomes known and successful. Yet, it won't be long before his popularity begins to fade. People will question him. They will speak with suspicion about him, "who does he think he is?" The authorities will be threatened by him. The admired Jesus will become the hated Jesus. The salvation Jesus brings will not be accomplished by casting out evil spirits as we see in the gospel today. It will come through his suffering, death, and resurrection, which is far more amazing and astonishing than any kind of exorcism or healing.
