The Second Sunday of Lent

Most of the time when I am called to celebrate a funeral home service, I usually read today's gospel story, the Transfiguration. The funeral home staff probably think, "Here he goes again!" I don't mind if they do, because repetition helps us understand and "drills" the point into us. For most Christian people, the story of the Transfiguration is one that they don't hear too often, or often enough. The Transfiguration narrative from St. Mark, takes place with inner core of the disciples group---Peter, James and John. The story takes place on a mountain. When Jesus goes to the top a mountain, expect something exciting to take place, like an encounter with his Father. There on the mountain, an affirmation of Jesus' identity takes place. This time it takes place through visual and auditory means and the disciples see it and hear it! Today Jesus is changed, so much so, that the disciples cannot look at him. His clothes are "whiter than any bleacher can make them." The disciples saw a glimpse of the resurrection. The disciples also see two major figures of the Old Testament: Moses the giver of the Law, and Elijah, one of the first of the prophets. Dead for ages, yet these two men are very much alive and speaking to Jesus. Peter is so beside himself he just wants to stay on the top of the mountain. Who wouldn't?! But Jesus knows he must go back down from the mountain, there to be rejected, crucified, and then resurrected from the dead. The final piece of this text is the cloud and the voice (remember the voice when Jesus was baptized) speaks somewhat the same message of Jesus' baptism: "This is my Son. Listen to Him." The voice of God attempts to soothe the disciples fear and apprehension as the life of Jesus will turn tragic at the hands of those who have no idea who Jesus really is. May we too experience the resurrection of Jesus from the dead one day as He resurrects our mortal bodies as well.
