## Christos Anesti! Alithos Anesti!

Χριστός Ανέστη! Αληθώς ανέστη!

In the earliest times after the Resurrection, people would greet one another at Easter by saying, "Christos Anesti, Alithos Anesti." One person greets the first by saying "Christ is risen!" The response is, "Truly He is risen indeed!" What a powerful reminder of the ongoing reality of the Resurrection. It does not happen in the past; it is happening right now - with a special emphasis as we celebrate Easter. What power the Risen Christ has - the bounds of death have been cast off and sin is vanquished! New life in eternity is ours through our Lord Jesus. In Luke's Gospel for Easter we encounter the women at the tomb. They have been told to seek Jesus elsewhere; that he was among the living and not the dead. This Paschal Feast is truly special. Last year we were able to celebrate via livestream only.
